


What's your lead? Why?



Actual lead: ♠ A
Suggested lead: ♦ K


Partner supporting your suit is not permission for leading an unsupported Ace

Bidding notes:


W's strong hand with support & a void in opponent's suit suggests bidding on.

Alternatives: X or 3 ♠.

X is better as it is more flexible.



What's your lead? Why?



Actual lead: ♥ 7
Suggested lead: ♦ A

An aggressive defense, based on the bidding and your holding, may be effective.

Bidding notes:

S hand is a R20. S jumps to game over Responder's 2 NT which shows 11-12 HE & 2-card support.

Commentary:

Although many class examples show leading an unsupported Ace is not best, there are hands where it can work out. This is one of those situations.


W tries for a ruff with ◆ Ax as ♥s don't look promising. Without the ruff, EW makes 10 tricks.



A singleton Ace lead may pay dividends when conditions suggest a possibility of a ruff

Defensive notes:


The opponents bid confidently. W has little in the way of defense. However, there's a reasonable expectation of reaching partner's hand after cashing the • A.

This defense is unlikely to cost a trick on this hand. N leads the singleton Ace instead of partner's suit and is rewarded by holding the opponents to 10 tricks (-420) instead of giving up 11 tricks (-450).

Using an Ace to overtake your partner's honor to play from your hand is often overlooked


Defensive notes:

Overtake partner's • K to lead a trump through Declarer.

Bidding notes:

The X by Partner (E) shows a strong 4-card suit. E might also have a 4-card ♥ suit; this adds up to declarer having 3/4 Diamonds.

It's imperative to eliminate ruff(s).




Final bidding note:

The X by E shows a strong 4-card suit and a willingness to defend.

With a singleton Spades and seven Hearts, South has a clear "preference" for Hearts.

A 3 • bid by Advancer typically shows a strong hand, but after the X, South's bid becomes a "runout" from a possible, steep penalty.



An Ace can keep communication with partner for a later entry

Defensive plan:

Leading dummy's first bid suit is typically a singleton, but here that doesn't look likely. As we generally avoid leading from an outside Q, this lead is most likely from a worthless doubleton.

If it is, partner will almost assuredly have a trump entry. You probably have no other entry to your hand except the * A.

Duck this trick with the 46.

Going up with the ◆ A gives away a trick. Declarer will throw away a ♥ on the ◆ K to win 11 tricks.
